

## **CHAPTER IV**

### **ANALYSIS AND FINDINGS**

#### **4.1. Analysis of the Types of Deixis in the speech “King Charles III’s Speech Given as First Address After Death of Queen Elizabeth II”**

This chapter analyzes the research and results regarding Deixis in the speech “Deixis Analysis of The King Charles III’s Speech In The King Coronation”. The main purpose of this chapter is to answer the questions based on the problem in Chapter I. Finally, this study found that King Charles used types of Deixis in speech such as Person Deixis, Time Deixis, Place Deixis, Social Deixis, and Discourse Deixis in “Deixis Analysis of The King Charles III’s Speech In The King Coronation”.

In this speech, some words contain Deixis from the five types of Deixis. 109 utterances were found using Person Deixis, 5 utterances using Place Deixis, 8 utterances using Time Deixis, 9 utterances using Social Deixis, and the last 12 utterances found using Discourse Deixis.

After collecting the data, the types of Deixis are classified based on the types of Deixis are classified based on the types of Deixis in King Charles’s speech “King Charles III’s First Speech After the Death of Queen Elizabeth II”. This study found the Deixis of Person, Time, Place, Social, And Discourse. A detailed description is given below:

From the table above, we can see which types were used in King Charles III's speech. In the table above, King Charles's speech uses all types of deixis: person deixis, place deixis, time deixis, social deixis and discourse deixis. Person deixis is the most widely used type of deixis by King Charles.

## 4.2 Findings

Based on the analysis in this chapter, it was found that King Charles used all types of Deixis in the speech "King Charles III's First Speech After the Death of Queen Elizabeth II" which was conveyed on one of the You Tube channels, in fact almost all of words Deixis. In Person Deixis, King Charles uses 3 types of Person Deixis: First Person Deixis, Second Person Deixis, and Third Person Deixis. The Deixis Person used by King Charles in this speech is "I, Me, My, Myself" in the First Person singular. "We, Us, Our" is used by King Charles in the speech as the First plural person. Then the use of Second Person Deixis by King Charles in this speech includes "You, Your" refers to all You Tube viewers who watched the video showing King Charles's speech. Then the use of Third Person Deixis by King Charles in this speech includes "He, She, Him, Her" referring to someone as the main character in the speech. "They, Their" is Third Person Deixis for plural possessive pronouns. Then "It" refers to things that have been mentioned earlier. King Charles uses Person Deixis in the speech to show the use of personal pronouns in King Charles's speech.

Place Deixis in this speech is the word "Where" as Distal Term Deixis, "Bring and Beside" as a Proximal Term Deixis. The function of using Place Deixis by King Charles is to indicate the use of distance or location in speech. Time Deixis in this speech is divided into pure deixis and specific time then Time Deixis Verb tense. The words "Today, Now, 70 years, In 1947, Last seventy years, 17 years ago, Weeks time". Time Deixis refers to information about when



that moment occurred. The Time Deixis function used by King Charles is to show the use of time in speeches.

Social Deixis in this speech found the use of the words “Her Majesty, The Queen, The Ducky, Prince of Wales, Prince, Princess”. Social Deixis aims to show the differences in social status that exist between the audience and the people of England and the speaker or King Charles and the people of England and the speaker or King Charles and the people involved in the speech spoken by King Charles. The function of using Social Deixis King Charles shows social status or intimacy relative to the video audience King Charles speech on You Tube Chanel. The last is Discourse Deixis King Charles’s use of the words “It, That, You all, This, My beloved mother”. The function of using Discourse Deixis by King Charles shows that the word has a relationship or relationship with the previous text. This study found Person Deixis with a total of 107 times, Discourse Deixis 12 times, Social Deixis as many as 9 times Time Deixis as many as 8 times, and finally with the lowest total Place Deixis only 7 times.

#### **4.2.1 Persona Deixis**

Personal deixis concern the coding of the participants in the speech events in which the utterances are made. The personal category is divided into three: the first person category is the speaker’s own grammar, the second person is the speaker’s reference encoding to one or more addresses. Third person encoded references to person and entities that are not the speaker or receiver (Levinson, 1983).

### 1. First Person Deixis

First Person Deixis is the speaker's reference to someone or more involved in a conversation. In speech "King Charles III's Speech After the Death of Queen Elizabeth II", King Charles uses First Person Deixis such as "I, Myself, We, Us, Our, My, and Me".

## 2. Second Person Deixis

Second Person Deixis is the encoding of a speaker’s reference to one or more receivers. In this speech, King Charles also finds the use of Second Person Deixis such as “You and Your”.

The word “You” as the second singular person in the speech above refers to all the people who watched the video of King Charles’s speech on the You Tube channel and other media.

Data 25 :

The word “You” in the second person singular above refers to British society.

### 3. Third Person Deixis

Third Person Deixis is encoding reference to persons and entities that are not the speaker or recipient of the speech. The common way participant roles are encoded in language is the pronoun and the associated predicate agreement. In other words, third person deixis refers to a referent who is not identified as the speaker or receiver. In King Charles’s speech there is also the use of the third person deixis in the speech as in “she, He, It, Her, Him, They, Their”.

The word “Her” in King Charles’s speech refers to the pronoun of Queen Elizabeth II who has death.

and Deixis “Myself” 1 time in delivering the speech “Deixis Analysis of The King Charles III’s Speech In The King Coronation” on Chanel You Tube.

It is known from the table in speech “Deixis Analysis of The King Charles III’s Speech In The King Coronation”, King Charles III used second Person Deixis and made several repetitions of using Second Person Deixis such as using Deixis “You” 9 times, Deixis “Your” 4 times

It is known from the table that in speech “Deixis Analysis of The King Charles III’s Speech In The King Coronation”, King Charles used a lot of Third Person Deixis and made several repetitions of using Third Person Deixis such as using Deixis “They” 3 times, Deixis “Their” 1 time, Deixis “He” 1 time, . Deixis “She” 6 times, Deixis “Him” 2 times, Deixis “It” 2 times, and Deixis “Her” 11 times in King Charles III’s speech.

From the table, we can see that “Deixis Analysis of The King Charles III’s Speech In The King Coronation” includes three types of Person Deixis (First Person Deixis, Second Person Deixis, Third Person Deixis). The use of First Person Deixis in this speech is represented by the use of the word Deixis “I, We, Us, Our, My, Me, Myself”, then the word shows Second Person Deixis which is indicated by the Deixis “You and Your”, the last is Deixis The Third Person represented by the use of Deixis words “They, Their, He, She, Him, It, Her” the use of Person Deixis followed by the three types of Personal Deixis.

#### 4.2.2 Place Deixis

Place deixis (Spatial or Place Deixis) is deixis that refers to location according to the speaker in a speech event. For speakers, a location that talking about is relative. All speakers of languages, broadly speaking, differentiate place deixis from proximal deixis (referring to objects far from the speaker). Place deixis also concerns the coding of spatial location relative to the location of the participants in the speech event.

It is known from the table in speech “King Charles III’s First Speech After the Death of Queen Elizabeth II”. King Charles used Place Deixis term such as using Deixis Place “where” 2 times. It also found that use of the Deixis Place Proximal term used by King Charles III’s speech such as “bring and beside” 3 time.

#### 4.2.3 Time Deixis

Time deixis is usually grammatical with adverbs of time (Now, Yesterday, Then, This Year, etc.), but is mainly used in tenses. The direct words yesterday, today, and tomorrow anticipate a calendar or absolute way of referring to the days

concerned. Time deixis words show the time of events relative to the time you speak. From the speech of King Charles III “King Charles III’s First Speech After the Death of Queen Elizabeth II”. The speech also noted that King Charles only used Deixis Time to indicate time only a few times.

Data 1 :

*Utterance: I speak to you **today** with feelings of profound sorrow.*

The word “Today” as a special time of pure deixis in the speech above refers to the day King Charles made a speech on Chanel You Tube to express thanks and condolences for the death of Queen Elizabeth II.

From the table, this study finds pure Time Deixis. then, it can be seen that speech “King Charles III’s First Speech After the Death of Queen Elizabeth II” time deixis occurs. This study found Time Deixis word uses “Today, 70 years, In 1947, Last seventy years, Now, 17 years ago, weeks time”. Based on the explanation above, this research includes the use of Time Deixis from the utterance “King Charles III’s First Speech After the Death of Queen Elizabeth II” by King Charles.

#### 4.2.4 Social Deixis

Social Deixis deals with aspects of sentences that reflect or shape the concrete reality of the social situation in which the speech takes place. Social deixis pays attention to the aspects of sentences that reflect or shape or are determined by the specific reality of the social situation in which the speech take place. Of course many aspects of language use depend on this relationship, but this usage is only relevant to the topic of social deixis as far as grammar goes. Social deixis refers to social social characteristics or distinctions between participants or references in a speech event. In “King Charles III’s First Speech After the Death of Queen Elizabeth II” speech, King Charles is also found to be using Social Deixis in speech.

#### 4.2.5 Discourse Deixis

Discourse Deixis connecting with the orientation in the text through the writer or speaker, the relationship of the parts of the text with the current utterance or as head of time or past, future or simultaneity. Discourse with repetition or substitution. Cataphora is pointing to something that is mentioned later. Discourse Deixis expression linguistics refers to a particular part of a particular part of a discourse wider place where the occurrence of expressions occurs. Discourse Deixis is differentiated into anaphora and cataphora, which function as a means of cohesion text. The forms used to express the deixis of discourse are words or phrase this, that, the former, the following, the first mentioned, that is, etc.
